Highlights This Week:

House Keeps Tuition Discussion Alive; Tuition Authority Bill Dies in Senate: On Tuesday, the House of Representatives overwhelmingly approved a tuition “shell” bill to keep alive discussions on a possible tuition increase this session. The bill, HB 1296 by Rep. Bill Settle (D – Muskogee) and Sen. Cal Hobson (D – Lexington), was passed by a vote of 81 yes and 15 no. The current version of the bill (which can be seen at http://www2.lsb.state.ok.us/1999-00HB/hb1296_engr.rtf) does not include an actual tuition increase but simply contains the section of law that would have to be amended to authorize an increase. The bill’s next stop will be a committee in the Senate.

Also on Tuesday, SB 706 by Sen. Penny Williams (D – Tulsa) died when Sen. Williams declined to have the bill reconsidered by the Senate. The bill, which would have allowed the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education to develop a four-year tuition plan, was defeated on the Senate floor last week by a vote of 19 yes and 27 no. At that time, Sen. Williams lodged a motion that allowed her to ask the Senate to reconsider the vote on the bill within three legislative days. She chose not to exercise that option.

State Regents Schedule Public Hearing on Tuition: The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education have scheduled a public hearing on Friday, April 16 to receive comments on a proposed tuition increase. The State Regents’ proposal calls for an increase in resident tuition *not to exceed* 9% at the comprehensive universities, 7% at the regional universities, and 5% at the two-year colleges and technical branches. House Passes Speaker’s Scholarship Program: On Tuesday, the House passed HB 1759, an extensive education bill sponsored by Speaker Loyd Benson (D – Frederick). The bill authorizes a major new state scholarship program but also addresses the controversial K-12 education issues of open transfer and charter schools. The bill passed easily on a final vote of 94-5. However, this was only after three amendments offered by Republican legislators were rejected by votes cast primarily along party lines.

Sections 1-6 of the bill create the Oklahoma Tuition Scholarship Program to be administered by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education. According to the Tulsa World, the Speaker said that in

the first year of the scholarship awards, in FY2004, an estimated 11,000 students would be eligible at a projected cost of \$15-16 million. Over the next several years, the program's annual cost would be expected to grow to \$30-40 million. Provisions of the scholarship program include:

- Students graduating high school in 2002-03 would be the first students eligible for the scholarship (this year's 8th graders).
- The scholarship is good for only the first two years of college.
- The scholarship can only be used to cover resident tuition (general enrollment fees) at state public colleges; private colleges and area vo-tech schools are not included.
- The student must be a resident of Oklahoma for two years immediately preceding high school graduation.
- The student must have graduated from a high school accredited by the State Board of Education; home-schooled students and unaccredited high schools are excluded.
- The student must complete a required core curriculum in high school to earn a "diploma of honor". The required curriculum is 13.5 units-- 4 English, 3 math, 3 social studies, 3 science, and 1/2 unit in "the area of technology". In addition, the courses qualifying for this core curriculum must be those recommended by the ACT testing corporation. Furthermore, applied vocational math and science classes will not qualify.
- The student must achieve a minimum ACT test score equal to the admission requirement for a regional university in the Oklahoma State System of Higher Education. Currently that score is a 19; however, it will increase to 20 in the fall of 2000.
- The student must meet the regular admission standards for the type of institution they wish to attend.
- The student must actually be admitted and enrolled in the institution before the scholarship is paid.
- The student must make application for state and federal financial aid programs.
- The student must not have been adjudicated/convicted of certain juvenile/adult offenses.
- The scholarship will pay for a maximum of 60 credit hours and no more than 30 hours in a single year.
- The scholarship will be reduced or eliminated if the student receives any other state or federal aid for tuition costs.
- To maintain eligibility for the scholarship in college, the student must maintain a 2.5 GPA.

Other items in the bill directly related to higher education include:

- Math teacher certification/incentives (sections 8-9).
- Forgivable loan program for college students at the junior, senior or graduate level who agree to teach in shortage areas as defined by the State Board of Education (section 12).

The three proposed amendments that were rejected had the following objectives:

- Allow the scholarships to be used at any institution where federal Pell grants may be used. This would include private colleges and some proprietary schools. (offered by Rep. Kevin Calvey, R – Del City)
- Allow home-schooled students and students from all non-public high schools to be eligible for the scholarship. (offered by Rep. Jim Newport, R – Ponca City)
- Mandate that the State Board of Education require all students to meet the curricular requirements of the diploma of honor. (offered by Rep. John Sullivan, R – Tulsa)

Legislative Action Returns to Committees: Next week, legislative activity will return to the committees which have two weeks to pass out bills received from the opposite house. See the section below on “Upcoming Meetings/Events” for those committee meetings that have already been scheduled. Several bills we are tracking are on committee meeting agendas. Additional meetings are likely to be scheduled early next week.

Correction: Last week we reported the floor vote on SB 382, a bill by Sen. Bernest Cain (D – Oklahoma City) related to faculty personnel issues. The vote was 31 yes, 14 no. We reported that the yes vote consisted of 30 Democrats and 1 Republican while the no vote included 13 Republicans and 1 Democrat. However, our count was off by one on each side. The actual vote was 29 Democrats and 2 Republicans voting yes while 12 Republicans and 2 Democrats voted no.

SENATE BILLS

SB 2 (Taylor/Benson) - **HEALTH INSURANCE/MENTAL ILLNESS.** Requires group health insurance and health benefit plans to include coverage for treatment of adults, adolescents and children with severe mental illness; permits insurers to offer such benefits through a managed care system; requires that such benefits be equal to treatment of and subject to the same preauthorization and utilization review mechanisms as all other physical diseases and disorders; provides an exemption for policies providing coverage for a specified disease or other limited benefit coverage and for groups with 50 or fewer employees; defines "severe mental illness" as schizophrenia, bipolar disorder (manic-depressive illness), major depression, panic disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder and schizoaffective disorder; makes such requirement inapplicable to an agreement, contract or policy in which such coverage will result in an increase of more than 3 percent in premium cost. The amendment adds alcohol and drug abuse treatment to required coverage. (36 §§ 6060.10, 6060.11)

SB 7 (Williams/Boyd) - **OSU-TULSA/ROGERS UNIVERSITY.** Changes the name of Oklahoma State University/Tulsa to Oklahoma State University-Tulsa and also includes substantive amendments pertaining to the transfer of assets from the Rogers University/Tulsa foundation; provides that any curricula offered by OU and OSU at the undergraduate level may be offered at the OU/OSU Graduate Center at Tulsa. (70 §§ 4662/4668, 4670/4671, 4673)

SB 10 (Ford/Adair) - **BOARD EMPLOYEES.** Permits a state board or commission to employ a state employee who is an ex officio member of that board or commission and who is required by law to be a member of that entity. (74 § 4257)

SB 19 (Maddox/Paulk) - **ANSWERING MACHINES/VOICE MAIL.** Requires that the primary telephone number at state agencies be answered by an agency employee during normal business hours; prohibits the use of an answering device on the primary telephone designated to receive calls from the public during normal business hours or forwarded to a telephone that is not answered by an employee; provides an exception to allow agencies to use answering devices to answer calls during other than normal business hours and calls to other numbers the agency maintains. (74 § 3306)

SB 22 (Horner/Staggs) - **OKLAHOMA HIGHER LEARNING ACCESS PROGRAM FOR TEACHER PREPARATION.** Authorizes the State Regents to establish and maintain an Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program for Teacher Preparation, an incentive scholarship program to encourage the preparation of teachers, emphasizing minority teachers, in critical shortage area for the public schools at one or more of the state's public or private higher education institutions; requires that priority consideration be given to prospective teachers from under-represented minority groups and prospective teachers who meet the same requirements as for the existing Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program (OHLAP); states legislative intent that the Regents create a committee comprising educators, teacher educators from the participating institutions, other professionals from critical shortage area fields and representatives of public schools and the Department of Education to recommend to the Regents further criteria for selection of participants, procedures for admission, procedures and instruments for assessing the effectiveness of the program and any other criteria or procedures deemed necessary by the Regents; requires the committee to deliver a report on the program to the Legislature by July 1 of each year. (70 § 698.3)

SB 23 (Milacek/Reese) - **CREDIT CARDS.** Prohibits State System institutions from entering into agreements for merchandising of credit cards through such institution to an enrolled student who is under age 21, with certain exceptions. (14A § 1-112)

SB 36 (Herbert/Glover) - **SCHOOL LAND FUNDS.** Requires monthly distribution from permanent school funds, other educational funds and public building funds; requires that the percentage of annual distribution from the trust funds held by the Commissioners of the Land Office be 5 percent of the average of the fiscal-year-end market value for the preceding three fiscal years; requires that the market value of the trust funds be established using the fiscal year and balance of the total trust funds held by the custodial bank. The amendment provides that the act will become effective upon passage of the constitutional amendment proposed in SJR 2. (64 § 51.A)

SB 37 (Herbert/Glover) - **SCHOOL LAND FUNDS.** Removes restrictions on investment of permanent school funds and other educational funds; removes the prohibition against bond investments prior to an Attorney General's opinion on the legality and validity of such investment. The floor substitute removes restrictions on the investment of permanent school funds and other educational funds; allows investment of permanent school and other educational funds only in bonds issued in the U.S. and U.S.-dollar-denominated or other investments settled in U.S. dollars or traded on the U.S. exchange markets; prohibits the Commissioners of the Land Office from investing more than 45 percent of the permanent common school fund, other educational funds and public building funds in equity securities; requires that the 45-

percent-limitation be increased by 5 percent each year, for three years, until it reaches 60 percent. (64 § 51)

Creates an Oklahoma Tuition Scholarship Program to ensure that students who meet certain criteria, have completed a college preparatory curriculum upon graduation from high school and are intending to pursue studies at a State System higher education institution leading to an associate or baccalaureate degree are rewarded by having the first two years of tuition for enrollment at a State System institution paid for by the state; provides eligibility requirements; requires the State Regents to promulgate rules relating to maintenance of eligibility; states legislative intent that students graduating during the 2002-2003 school year be the first students eligible for benefits; limits the number of credits for which general enrollment fees will be satisfied to not exceed 60 hours, with not more than 30 hours in any one year; provides that if an eligible applicant receives state or federal tuition aid, the Regents shall adjust the award to cover only the unpaid portion, if any; changes the name of the certificate of distinction to the diploma of honor and modifies criteria to require four units in English, three each in mathematics, social studies, and science and one-half unit in the area of technology; requires that such units be core-curriculum courses; removes authorization for vo-tech courses to be included; directs the State Board of Education, beginning with students graduated in the 2002-2003 school year, to require all students, by the end of their senior year, to have earned four units in English and three units each in mathematics, social studies and sciences; requires that applicable vocational classes offered by comprehensive high school vo-tech programs qualify for the required academic units; requires remediation of students who do not perform satisfactorily on the mathematics portion of norm-referenced tests contingent upon the provision of appropriated funds; requires that public school mathematics teachers in grades six, seven or eight be certified at the intermediate or secondary level in mathematics; states legislative intent to establish a continuing education program whereby teachers certified to teach mathematics may continue their education beyond initial licensing and certification; requires that the program pay up to \$100 per credit hour for a teacher to take higher education courses in mathematics; provides for an appropriation to the State Board of Education to award grants to school sites for significantly increased average test scores; prohibits the use of more than 50 percent of such award for teacher bonuses; increases the award for teachers who attain National Board certification from \$5,000 to \$10,000; modifies criteria for forgivable loans; requires schools to expand alternative education programs to middle school grades; requires certain schools to expand alternative education to elementary school grades; directs schools to expand the annual student needs assessment and plan to include certain students; states legislative intent to provide funding for elementary-level school counselors; authorizes the board of education to adopt a dress code; directs school districts to distribute economically disadvantaged pupil weight State Aid to certain schools; creates the "Education Open Transfer Act"; provides for transfer of students; allows receiving districts to provide transporta-

tion to certain transferred students; creates the "Oklahoma Charter Schools Act"; provides for public schools established by contracts with local boards of education to provide learning that will improve student achievement; allows a charter school to consist of a new school, new schools or all or any portion of an existing school; prohibits private schools from applying; requires annual reports; repeals sections relating to student transfers. The floor substitute adds a section outlining an emergency transfer process; requires a two-year state residency for individuals to be eligible to participate in the Tuition Scholarship Program; adds language requiring any teacher teaching math at the sixth-grade level in an accredited K-6 school shall be exempt from certification at the intermediate or secondary level; lowers new national board certification bonus for teachers from \$10,000 to \$7,000; gives existing charter and enterprise schools until July 1, 2000, to revise their agreement and contract with a local school board pursuant to the Oklahoma Charter School Act; provides that any school which does not contract by July 1, 2000, shall revert back to its original status; deletes area vo-tech schools as possible charter school sponsors; prohibits charter schools from entering into employment contracts until the school has a contract with a sponsoring school district; requires that the employment contract set forth personnel policies of the school; provides that, with certain exceptions, a charter school shall be exempt from all statutes and rules relating to schools, boards of education and school districts; provides that a sponsoring school district shall determine whether a teacher who is employed at a charter school and who was previously employed at a sponsoring public school shall not lose any right of salary status or other benefit upon returning to the sponsoring school district to teach; prohibits the demographics of a charter school from varying from the demographics of the sponsoring school district by more than 10 percent. Changes the name of the Special Indemnity Fund to the Multiple Injury Trust Fund; requires the Board of managers of the State Insurance Fund to administer the Multiple Injury Trust Fund; authorizes the Board to transfer funds to the Multiple Injury Trust Fund to eliminate delinquent awards; requires reimbursement of insurance fund; makes the State Fund liable for premium taxes as if it were operating as a private carrier; requires that premium taxes be paid out of the fund's excess reserves and not passed on to policy holders so long as the fund is operating within the accepted industry standard of three-to-one premium-to-surplus ratio; provides that Multiple Injury Trust Fund awards shall accrue from the file date of the court order finding the claimant to be permanently and totally disabled; provides that a reopening of any prior injury claim other than the last employer injury claim shall not give a claimant the right to additional Multiple Injury Trust Fund benefits; provides that awards not claimed within two years of the date on which the award first become available shall be returned to the trust fund; requires that the premium tax on premiums collected by the State Insurance Fund be paid by the 30th day of the month of receipt to the state treasurer; requires that 0.25 percent of such funds be credited to the Attorney General for permanent total disability or permanent partial disability awards paid out or payable for the month, to be deposited in the Attorney General's Workers' Compensation Fraud Unit Revolving Fund, 0.25 percent to the Department of Vocational and

Technical Education and all other monies to the trust fund so long as the fund has reserves of not more than \$5 million; requires that remaining premium tax monies be deposited in the General Revenue Fund, once the trust fund has reserves of more than \$5 million. The floor substitute deletes language which provided that premium taxes paid by the State Insurance Fund would be paid out of excess reserves and prohibited their cost from being passed on to policyholders; adds language providing for payment of interest on claims made on awards returned to the multiple injury trust fund after two years, if the claimant is subsequently found and claims the award; modifies apportionment of insurance fund premium tax proceeds as follows: to pay delinquent permanent partial disability awards and to build reserves of the multiple injury trust fund to \$5 million (deleting apportionment to Attorney General's fraud unit and vo-tech department, but retaining requirement that remaining premium tax monies be deposited in the General Revenue Fund).
