Highlights This Week:

Higher Education Issues Still Pending: As the Legislature heads into the final two weeks of the 1999 session, a number of important higher education issues remain unresolved. Among the issues are:

- **Regular State Appropriations:** The House and Senate Education Subcommittees of the General Conference Committee on Appropriations (GCCA) are still working on final allocations of \$29.5 million to be dispersed among twelve education agencies.
- **Rainy Day Fund Appropriations:** No final agreement has yet been reached for the use of up to \$148 million available in the state's Rainy Day Fund. Higher Education received \$24 million from the fund for the current FY'99 budget year. This \$24 million was not built into higher education's appropriation "base" in the General Appropriation Bill approved in April.
- **Tuition:** A current proposal to increase tuition by 7% at the two-year colleges, 7% at the regional four-year universities, and 8% at the comprehensive universities is still being negotiated.
- **Capital Bond Issue:** A major state capital bond issue that would benefit higher education is still being discussed between the Governor and legislative leaders. Points of contention include the total amount of the bond issue, the revenue source for making bond payments, and the specific capital projects to be funded.

The Legislature does not normally meet on Fridays. However, with several hundred bills left to consider, the Legislature is expected to be in session next Friday, May 21. Most regular appropriation bills are also expected to be approved by May 21. This allows the Legislature to attempt overrides of any gubernatorial vetoes.

- Donna Moesel of Oklahoma City was named to the Board of Regents for Redlands Community College to serve a term ending April 22, 2006 succeeding Richard Fogg.

- Randell Ward, 60, of McAlester was reappointed to the Board of Regents for Eastern State College to serve a term ending June 1, 2006.
- Joe Cole, 58, of Edmond was reappointed to the Board of Regents for Rose State College to serve a term ending July 1, 2006.
- Derrill Cody of Norman was named to the Board of Regents for Seminole State College to serve a term ending July 1, 2006 succeeding Jack Mattingly.
- Ed Hicks, 51, of Duncan was named to the Board of Regents of the University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma to serve a term ending June 30, 2006 succeeding Truman Harris.
- Steven Blankenship, 47, of Idabel was named to the Board of Trustees for the McCurtain County Higher Education Program to serve a term ending June 30, 2005 succeeding Linda DeBerry.
- Malcolm Maguire, 63, of Oklahoma City was named to the Oklahoma Educational Television Authority to serve a term ending June 30, 2006 succeeding Elaine Dodd.
- John Kahre, 43, of Ramona was reappointed to the Teachers Retirement System of Oklahoma to serve a term ending July 1, 2003.

New State Regent Confirmed by Senate: The Senate this week confirmed the nomination of James D. Harrel as a new State Regent. The Senate Education Committee recommended approval of the nomination on Monday by a unanimous vote of 17-0. The full Senate confirmed the nomination Tuesday by a near unanimous vote of 36 ayes, 1 nay (Sen. Jerry Smith, R – Tulsa). Mr. Harrel succeeds Frederick McCann and begins a nine-year term ending May 16, 2008.

Campus Security Bill Rejected: On Wednesday, the Senate rejected the conference committee report for SB 517. The bill would have given campus security officials greater latitude to remove persons from college property. The vote against the bill was 19 ayes, 28 nays. Procedurally, the bill was then returned to its conference committee where it can possibly be revised and brought back to the Senate for another vote.

Status Reported as of May 13, 1999

SENATE BILLS

SB 2 (Taylor/Benson) - **HEALTH INSURANCE/MENTAL ILLNESS.** Creates the “Dr. James M. Behrman Mental Health Parity Act”; requires group health insurance and health benefit plans to provide benefits for treatment of adults, adolescents and children with severe mental illness; limits the requirement to benefits provided through in-network coverage in a managed care system; requires that such benefits be equal to treatment of and subject to the same preauthorization and utilization review mechanisms as all other physical diseases and disorders; provides an exemption for policies providing coverage for a specified disease or other limited benefit coverage and for groups with 50 or fewer employees; defines "severe mental illness" as schizophrenia, bipolar disorder (manic-depressive illness), major depression, panic disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder and schizoaffective disorder; makes such requirement inapplicable to an agreement, contract or policy in which such coverage will result in an increase of more than 2 percent in premium cost; sunsets mental health benefit requirements in the measure on May 1, 2003; requires that the Insurance Commissioner submit a report by Dec. 1, 2002, analyzing the direct incremental premium costs of requiring health plans to include severe mental illness benefits; provides a 50-percent tax credit for employers based upon any increase in premium costs for plans that provide mental health coverage. The conference committee substitute defines "severe mental illness" as schizophrenia, bipolar disorder (manic-depressive illness), major depression, panic disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder and schizoaffective disorder; requires health benefit plans to provide benefits for treatment of severe mental illness; requires that such benefits be equal to benefits for treatment of and subject to the same preauthorization and utilization review mechanisms as all other physical diseases and disorders; provides an exemption for coverage provided by a health benefit plan for small employers; exempts a health benefit plan that, at the end of its base period, experiences a greater than 2-percent increase in premium costs; requires the Insurance Commissioner to analyze the direct incremental impact on premium costs for requiring health plans to include severe mental illness benefits; requires the Commissioner to submit a report by May 1, 2000; requires that the final report include, to the extent possible, an analysis of any other direct or indirect benefit of requiring benefits for treatment of severe mental illness; provides that, if the report shows that the cumulative average premium increase during the first three years of implementation of the act that is directly attributable to the mental illness benefits is greater than 6 percent, the requirements shall terminate May 1, 2003. (36 §§ 6060.10/6060.12; 68 § 2357.66)

SB 10 (Ford/Adair) - **BOARD EMPLOYEES.** Permits a state board or commission to employ a state employee who is an ex officio member of that board or commission and who is required by law to be a member of that entity; provides that the bill shall not apply to a statewide elected official who is an ex officio member of a board or commission. (74 § 4257)

SB 19 (Maddox/Paulk) - **ANSWERING MACHINES/VOICE MAIL.** Requires that the primary telephone number at state agencies be answered by an agency employee during normal business hours; prohibits the use of an answering device on the primary telephone designated to receive calls from the public during normal business hours or forwarded to a telephone that is not answered by an employee; provides an exception to allow agencies to use answering devices to answer calls during other than normal business hours and calls to other numbers the agency maintains. (74 § 3306)

SB 36 (Herbert/Glover) - **SCHOOL LAND FUNDS.** Requires monthly distribution from permanent school funds, other educational funds and public building funds; requires that the percentage of annual distribution from the trust funds held by the Commissioners of the Land Office be 5 percent of the average of the fiscal-year-end market value for the preceding three fiscal years; requires that the market value of the trust funds be established using the fiscal-year-end-balance of the total trust funds held by the custodial bank; provides that the act will become effective upon passage of the constitutional amendment proposed in SJR 2. (64 § 51.A)

SB 37 (Herbert/Glover) - **SCHOOL LAND FUNDS.** Removes restrictions on the investment of permanent school funds and other educational funds; allows investment of permanent school and other educational funds only in bonds issued in the U.S. and U.S.-dollar-denominated or other investments settled in U.S. dollars or traded on the U.S. exchange markets; prohibits the Commissioners of the Land Office from investing more than 45 percent of the permanent common school fund, other educational funds and public building funds in equity securities; requires that the 45-percent-limitation be increased by 5 percent over a three-year period, until it reaches 50 percent; requires the Commissioners to reserve and retain forever title to all oil, gas and other mineral rights in and under all lands to be sold or designated for certain purposes; prohibits the Commissioners from selling any oil, gas or other mineral interest under their jurisdiction without prior legislative approval. (64 § 51)

SB 38 (Morgan/Corn) - **SURPLUS EQUIPMENT.** Authorizes state agencies to dispose of obsolete or surplus equipment to entities within the State System. (62 § 120.1)

SB 43 (Helton/Kirby) - **POW/MIA RECOGNITION DAY.** Designates the third Friday of September of each year as POW/MIA Recognition Day; authorizes and requests the Governor to authorize all state agencies to fly the flag of the National League of Families of American Prisoners of War and Missing in Action. (25 § 90.13)

SB 60 (Herbert/Glover) - **SCHOOL LAND FUNDS.** Changes the nature of funds to be distributed by the Commissioners of the Land Office. (70 §§ 614, 3904)

SB 66 (Williams/Boyd) - **TEACHER PREPARATION/COMPETENCY EXAMS.** Modifies requirements for taking teacher competency examinations to remove language requiring that teacher candi-

dates be eligible following completion of the junior year or after having completed 90 college credit hours; repeals a section relating to certain course requirements. (70 §§ 6-187, 6-128)

SB 86 (Weedn/Hilliard) - **FUNERAL DIRECTORS/EMBALMERS/ EDUCATION**. Changes the accreditation entity for approved programs of mortuary science from the Conference of Funeral Service Examining Boards of the United States to the American Board of Funeral Service Education; specifies qualifications for funeral directors; modifies requirements for reciprocal licensing of embalmers and funeral directors. (59 § 396.3)

SB 89 (Williams/Roberts) - **EDUCATION OVERSIGHT BOARD**. Modifies residency requirements for members of the Education Oversight Board to require that at least one appointed member reside in each congressional district. (70 § 3-116)

SB 102 (Horner/Stites) - **OKLAHOMA HIGHER LEARNING ACCESS PROGRAM (OHLAP)**. Modifies eligibility for the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program; removes language that required eligible students to maintain a 2.5 cumulative grade point average “irrespective of honor points”; allows financial need to be established during the eighth-grade year as well as the ninth- or tenth-grade year; prohibits allocations from the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Trust Fund for students enrolled in a postsecondary vo-tech program or course from exceeding the amount a student would have received for comparable enrollment at a two-year State System institution; requires that a student be eligible for financial assistance under the program if the student's family income does not exceed 225 percent of the federal poverty guidelines but not if the student's family income exceeds 200 percent of the federal poverty guidelines for a family of four. The conference committee substitute changes financial need for assistance by raising the maximum income from taxable and nontaxable sources of the student’s parents to \$32,000, instead of the current \$24,000. (70 §§ 2603/2605)

SB 108 (Long/Gilbert) - **HEALTH INSURANCE/FREEDOM OF CHOICE**. Expands locations at which services and procedures covered under an accident and health insurance policy may be performed pursuant to the Health Care Freedom of Choice Act to include ambulatory surgical centers; includes such centers in types of facilities for which a provision, exclusion or limitation in an accident and health insurance policy shall be void. (36 §§ 6054, 6056, 6057)

SB 121 (Haney/Settle) - **APPROPRIATIONS/OKLAHOMA CENTER FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY (OCAST)**. Appropriates to the Oklahoma Center for the Advancement of Science and Technology (OCAST); limits the salary of the executive director of OCAST.

SB 747 (Williams/Boyd) - **ACADEMY SCHOOLS.** "Academy Schools Act"; defines "academy school" as a public school established by contract with a board of education of a public school district, a governing board of an institution of higher education, a municipality or the State Board of Education to provide learning that will improve student achievement; specifies contents of applications for academy schools; provides for establishment of academy schools under contract; requires a local board of education or the state board to either accept or reject sponsorship of an academy school within 90 days of receipt of an application; gives an applicant 30 days to submit a revised application after notification of rejection and the school board 30 days to accept or reject the revised application; provides for appeal to the State Board of Education of applications rejected by local boards; specifies requirements for contracts for academy schools; requires that academy schools be nonsectarian in their programs, admission policies, employment practices and all other operations; prohibits a sponsor from authorizing an academy school or program that is affiliated with a private sectarian school or religious institution; requires that academy schools provide a comprehensive program of instruction for at least a kindergarten program or any grade between grades one and 12; authorizes instruction to persons younger than age five and older than age 18; requires academy schools to design programs to at least meet the core curriculum adopted by the state board and to participate in the testing as required by the Oklahoma School Testing Program Act; provides for auditing requirements; prohibits an academy school from being used as a method of providing education or generating revenue for students who are being home schooled; prohibits an academy school from charging tuition; requires that an academy school be considered a school district for purposes of tort liability under the Governmental Tort Claims Act; limits terms for academy school contracts to five years from the first day of operation; provides for renewal; allows an academy school, in the event a renewal is denied, to apply to another sponsor to transfer the operation of the school; provides for termination of contracts; specifies requirements for admission of students; requires that academy schools be funded at the same level as other comparable schools in the school district in which the charter is

granted, taking into account the school's grade level, size and demographics; creates an "Academy Schools Stimulus Fund" within the State Treasury, administered by the Department of Education to provide financial support to academy school applicants and academy schools for start-up costs and costs associated with renovating or remodeling existing buildings and structures for use by an academy school. HB 1759 (Benson/Taylor) - **TUITION SCHOLARSHIP/CERTIFICATE OF DISTINCTION/SCHOOL TESTING/NATIONAL BOARD CERTIFICATION/CHARTER SCHOOLS**. Creates an Oklahoma Tuition Scholarship Program to ensure that students who meet certain criteria, have completed a college preparatory curriculum upon graduation from high school and are intending to pursue studies at a State System higher education institution leading to an associate or baccalaureate degree are rewarded by having the first two years of general enrollment fees for enrollment at a State System institution paid for by the state; provides eligibility requirements; requires the State Regents to promulgate rules relating to maintenance of eligibility; states legislative intent that students graduating during the 2002-2003 school year be the first students eligible for benefits; limits the number of credits for which general enrollment fees will be satisfied to not exceed 60 hours, with not more than 30 hours in any one year; provides that if an eligible applicant receives state or federal tuition aid, the Regents shall adjust the award to cover only the unpaid portion, if any; changes the name of the certificate of distinction to the diploma of honor and modifies criteria to require four units in English, three each in mathematics, social studies, and science and one-half unit in the area of technology; requires that such units be core-curriculum courses; removes authorization for vo-tech courses to be included; requires remediation of students who do not perform satisfactorily on the mathematics portion of norm-referenced tests contingent upon the provision of appropriated funds; requires the Board, beginning with the 2001-2002 school year, to contract to administer a series of grade-level appropriate, nationally normed, norm-referenced tests designed to determine the level of achievement attained by Oklahoma public school students; specifies norm-referenced tests to be administered; requires that the twelfth-grade criterion-referenced tests be replaced with end-of-instruction tests; specifies requirements for such tests; requires the Board to adopt a series of three student-performance-levels for end-of-instruction tests, with performance levels similar to those used for achievement levels on the National Assessment of Educational Progress; specifies requirements for reporting of tests results; requires that public school mathematics teachers in grades six, seven or eight be certified at the intermediate or secondary level in mathematics; states legislative intent to establish a continuing education program whereby teachers certified to teach mathematics may continue their education in order to obtain needed competencies; requires that the program pay up to \$100 per credit hour for a teacher to take higher education courses in mathematics; provides for an appropriation to the State Board of Education to award grants to school sites for significantly increased average test scores; prohibits the use of more than 50 percent of such award for teacher bonuses; increases the award for teachers who attain National Board certification from \$5,000 to \$7,000; modifies criteria for forgivable loans; requires schools to expand alternative education programs to middle school grades; requires certain schools to expand alternative education to elementary school grades; directs schools to expand the annual student needs assessment and plan to include certain at-risk students; states legislative intent to provide funds to school districts to hire school counselors at the elementary level; creates the "Education Open Transfer Act"; provides for transfer of students; allows receiving districts to provide transportation to certain transferred students; states legislative intent to appropriate money for increasing teacher salaries for teachers with three or more years of teaching experience; creates the "Charter Schools Act"; provides specifications for proposal to proposed sponsor; provides that a sponsor of charter school may be a board of education, a vo-tech institution, a governing board of a higher education institution, a municipality or the State Board of Education; provides that a sponsor may contract with a person, organization, public school, public body, or governing board of a public or private college or university; provides for applications for sponsorship, contracts, curriculum, testing, employment of teachers, and State Aid; requires the State Board of Education to develop an Academic Performance Index (API) to measure performance of schools and to develop an Academic Performance Award Program; expresses legislative intent that on or before July 1, 2004, salaries of certified Oklahoma teachers shall equal the regional aver-

age and on or before July 1, 2005, Oklahoma's average per-pupil-expenditure shall equal the regional average; provides that each day a child attends kindergarten for six hours shall be counted as one day of average daily attendance; sets a series of goals for high school core curriculum and specifies courses permitted for such curriculum. Changes the name of the Special Indemnity Fund to the Multiple Injury Trust Fund; requires the Board of Managers of the State Insurance Fund to administer the Multiple Injury Trust Fund; authorizes the Board to transfer funds to the Multiple Injury Trust Fund to eliminate delinquent awards; requires reimbursement of insurance fund; makes the State Fund liable for premium taxes as if it were operating as a private carrier; provides that Multiple Injury Trust Fund awards shall accrue from the file date of the court order finding the claimant to be permanently and totally disabled; provides that a reopening of any prior injury claim other than the last employer injury claim shall not give a claimant the right to additional Multiple Injury Trust Fund benefits; provides that awards not claimed within two years of the date on which the award first becomes available shall be returned to the trust fund; requires that the premium tax on premiums collected by the State Insurance Fund be paid by the 30th day of the month of receipt to the State Treasurer; provides for payment of interest on claims made on awards returned to the Multiple Injury Trust Fund after two years, if the claimant is subsequently found and claims the award; modifies apportionment of insurance fund premium tax proceeds as follows: to pay delinquent permanent partial disability awards and to build reserves of the Multiple Injury Trust Fund to \$5 million. Creates the "Oklahoma Managed Care External Review Act"; provides for external review of a decision under a health benefit plan to deny coverage of or reimbursement for a medical treatment or service that is otherwise a covered benefit; requires an insured person or the insured's designee to pay \$50 toward the cost of external review; provides procedures for the review; requires the State Board of Health to promulgate rules for the

certification of independent review organizations; provides qualifications for expert reviewers. The conference committee substitute provides that any person insured through a health benefit plan shall have the right to an external review by an independent review organization of a decision under the plan to deny coverage of or reimbursement for a medical treatment or service to the insured that is otherwise a covered plan when all applicable internal appeals procedures have been exhausted, the denial is based on a determination by the health benefit plan that the service or treatment is not medically necessary, medically appropriate or medically effective, the usual, customary and reasonable charge or allowable charge, as shown in the plan's fee schedule, of the service or treatment for which coverage or reimbursement was denied by the plan exceeds \$1,000 and the insured person or designee agrees to the terms and conditions of external review; provides exemptions; requires the State Board of Health and the Insurance Commissioner to promulgate rules for internal review procedures for plans subject to licensure or regulation by the applicable agency; requires the insured to pay \$50 to the health benefit plan toward the cost of an external review, with the plan being responsible for the remaining costs of the review process; limits appeals by an insured; prohibits a plan from removing a physician from its plan, refusing to renew a physician or otherwise disciplining a physician for advocating on behalf of an insured in either an internal review or external review; requires certification by the Board of Health for independent review organizations. (63 §§ 2528.1/2528.10)

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTIONS

HCR 1021 (Benson/Rabon) - JOB TRAINING. Directs the State Workforce Investment Board authorized by federal law, however denominated, to exercise the most deliberate consideration prior to implementing modifications to the system by which and the designated areas through which federal job training and related federal block grant funds are distributed; directs that the existing network and system of Service Delivery Areas that have demonstrated positive results in administration of federal job training programs be continued in force for purposes of implementing provisions of the federal Workforce Investment Act of 1998; directs that the existing network and Service Delivery Area system be used in their current configuration either alone or in conjunction with local workforce investment boards in order to avoid harm to the mechanism by which job training skills are provided to state citizens; directs all state agencies charged with responsibility for management, distribution, expenditure and accounting of both federal and state funds for implementation of federal block grants related to job training to exercise the most extreme care in modifying the existing system for management of federal job training programs and refrain from action that could jeopardize existing job training programs in the state.
